CRITIQUES



KEITH NUNAS

Nicely rendered mountains and foreground. This painting has many natural rhythms in it. The buildings are expertly drawn, and compositionally, this is a well balanced picture.



JOHANNE SEPTOU

This displays a beautiful show of colours. The ``V`` in the middle could be blurred out towards the darker sky.



JUDY WHITE

A touching portrait. The upper knee could be softened to downplay the `V` from the back of knee to pocket on her pants.



DIANA PANIZZON

Beautifully rendered and I really like the dandelion fluff going out from the flower head. Fluff on the underside just above the stem needs to be a bit darker.



RICHARD ST. AMANT

My eye goes straight to the yellow green rock in top centre. A bit more contrast in the other rocks would make them stand out and create more energy.

CRITIQUES (CONTINUED)



GAIL FAREWELL

Nicely done, beautiful colours. Even though it is a western style, the composition is very "oriental" (see notes for Lexi Zhu's piece). The frame is a nice touch.



LEXI ZHU

Your painting is almost like a fusion of Chinese with a bit of Western influence. In Chinese painting we forego perspective and any sense of space so that the objects float in the picture plane, and is acceptable. This whole picture is in green tones, you can mix it up by adding a bit of cobalt blue for a bit of variation and depth. The texture in the tulips are beautifully done, you almost want to touch them.



ROB GUETRE

Over the years I am impressed with the growth of the Club Artists. This portrait is really nice, really balanced. I particularly like the eyes and the facial expression. I really like the hand, and the underpainting in that area. Try a bit of red to vary the green tones in the background.



DONNA CHAMBERLAND

A beautiful piece. The purple with a touch of pink works quite well. If you can vary the hues a bit more, using a little bit stronger colour in some places, pushing the petals out a bit, this would enhance the sense of depth.



KERI HASKELL new member

This work peeked my imagination. The weight of the colours from top right to bottom left could be adjusted. The bottom could be a bit heavier in value to make the blue bit brighter.



ANDREW BEDINGFIELD

This tells an obvious story and conveys emotion. The looks nice in rectangular format and it to my heart when I was looking at it.

CRITIQUES (CONTINUED)



MARGE SOMKUTI

This is a happy picture. The flowers are dancing. The ink is well done and not overly defined or restrictive.



MARY FRANCES FITZGERALD

This painting could be looked at two ways, landscape or portrait. This picture tells an interesting story, seems like there could be people in this story. Maybe have these "people" at different heights in order to draw the viewer in to where you want him to look.



MICHAELA YANISH

The pink is your true signature. Looks very nice and works well. The textures in here are effectively rendered. In the centre, between the two peaks, you may want to darken or lighten a bit for contrast.





YVONNE BILAN-WALLACE

This is a nicely balanced piece. I like those yellow lines, beautifully placed and not evenly spaced, which is an attractive feature. Great perspective of the seagulls and waves. The waves could be a bit thinner towards the horizon line to enhance the illusion of depth.



PENNY LAMNEK

I like your use of pink, it is a challenging colour to work with. The blue and the green of the foliage works well with it. Pink and green make each other shine a little bit. A totally different colour could be added to the inner flowers to make them pop. The composition and strength of colours is expertly done.



As artists, we all know the mental benefits of creating art, but did you know that simply viewing art can be beneficial? Here are five reasons why your brain likes it when you look at art.

Put That Brain to Work

When you look at a new piece of art, your brain starts looking for patterns, shapes, and anything else that is familiar to make you feel more connected to the piece. Even if you don't "get" it, your brain is still going to work, trying to find meaning in what you're looking at.

Time to Escape

Art has been made for nearly as long as humans have existed. By looking at art from a different time, you're transported to the time and place that the artist has depicted & that helps your brain make you feel as if you're doing a little bit of escaping. The next time you step into a museum, think of it as timetraveling instead!

Chill Out

The next time you feel overwhelmed, stressed, or anxious, try taking a step back and looking at a piece of art. It can be a piece you have in your home, in a book, or even one that you pull up on your phone or computer. Take five minutes and really look at the piece, considering the colors, the perspective, the setting, the subject, and anything else you notice, and really think about it. Chances are, at the end of your five minutes, you'll feel better than you did before. Love, Love, Love

Do you need a little love? A University of London study showed that when a person looks at a piece of art that they see as beautiful, there is an instantaneous release of dopamine, a chemical that is linked to feelings of love, into the brain.




The Grand Canal of Venice (Blue Venice), Edouard Manet 1875

One study found that a single hour in a museum changed the way people thought and felt. The subjects of the study exhibited improved critical thinking skills, increased empathy for how people lived in the past, and improved tolerance for people different from themselves.
