







UST IMAGINE if the carpenter arrived to built your dream home with only a single screwdriver. Would you be surprised?



BOTANICAL ILLUSTRATION IN WATERCOLOR

HILE PHOTOS CAN ASSIST in helping record the elements of Botanical plants, no photograph can substitute for being able to see the actual plant. Photographs show the viewer a lifeless, static picture with elements of the actual structure missing or blurred. When the artist attempts to copy another artist's work in any form, it will result in an uninteresting or even flat portrayal. Works by other artists need to be carefully studied and it remains to be said that no two works of art will ever be the same. You can use other people's work for guidance and

ideas, but using nature as your subject is always the preferred option.

This book goes into explanations of colour, mixing colours and paint colour selections. There is a section on special colour challenges for Botanical Illustrators. The colour of botanital subjects presents many artists with a specific set of problems. This book goes into details regarding the spectrum of colours in botanital subjects.

Drawing and planning the design, as well as botanical accuracy are covered. The author deals with the use of shapes when drawing flowers as well as buds, stems and leaves. Pictures are used as the author illustrates examples of the thickness of leaves, the delineation of leaf edges, and the structure of flowers from the back (a view not often shown in flower paintings).


