JANET FRASER


A lively piece with metallics rendering throughout. Some of the branches could be a bit finer. This piece works well and is fine the way it is.




ADA WONG

The Colors are wonderful. The atmospheric perspective is awesome.



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



NOLA BUKVI

You have captured a new series. I love the yellow. The scumbled edge on his chin could be repeated on the left chin to






DONNA CHAMBERLIN

This is a wonderful job of handling the colors and format. The turquoise works well. Some of the surface could be sanded and another layer of color added. Looks good.




JOHANNE SEPTOU String Art pouring with paint.



PAINTOUT by DONNA MILLER: BFA, B. Ed.

I would like you to know about this year's Paintout. The plan is to paint in the David Thompson Country. I have chosen the Nordegg area because it is close to many painting spots that I know like Kootenay Plains, Cresent Falls, Abraham Lake, Windy Point, and Sifler Falls amongst others. There are other amenities at Nordegg like a nine hole golf course and the Brazeau Collieries mine tour, biking, hiking, and fishing. The dates are **Thursday, August 8 to Thursday Aug. 15, 2024**. There are several options for where you can stay.

- The Upper Shunda Creek Campground is a basic campground with two loops of treed sites and one area near Shunda Creek for oversized RV's.(over 30 feet in length). The website is **uppershundacampground.ca.** The phone number is **403 844-1293**.
- Nordegg is three minutes away where there is a dumping and potable water station and showers and laundromat at the Shell station. There is Wi-Fi at the Nordegg library. There are wells and toilets on site plus campfire supplies and a camp store. Generators are welcome. The cost is \$22 dollars weekdays and \$28 dollars for weekends. Check their website for registration, **uppershundacampground.ca**
- The Shunda Creek Hostel that is a Hi Canada Hostel is a great place to stay with a big shared kitchen and lounging area plus a Hot tub. There are shared bunk bed rooms with security and private ensuite. Power, plumbed bathrooms, and showers are part of the hostel. The cost is \$74 dollars a night. Check out their website; hihostels.com/hostels/hinordegg-shunda-creek-hostel/. I'm staying there.
- Another alternative is the Nordegg Lodge Hotel. Typical motel, costs \$100 for seniors or \$120 standard rates.




HOOT HOOT!

Not so much finger pricks with really sharp needles! Lucky I had a fabulous New Zealand teacher to guide me. Learned so much and have already applied some of the techniques to other art projects. Life size. From wing tip to wing tip 40" and from talons to top of head 20". 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What up with AI?


Do you remember a photo of your elders from a few generations ago? Have you ever thought about the type of camera created to capture your relatives in their staunch glory? I have photos from 3 previous generations and know that as an amateur photographer, I have been delighted with each new camera that has helped me create. Thank goodness for the ability to scan, upload and create my historical photo albums.

Now, let's jump to the year 2024. This past year we have started to work with generative artificial intelligence (AI), knowingly - or unknowingly. In many types of Facebook art groups I am beginning to see many FB comments questioning if the work posted is AI or AI-assisted. I read the negative comments if AI is suspected - so, the negativity begins. We have adapted to new technology over the decades, and yet this new generative technology is about the unknown control it might have over human intelligence. As I write, AI is busy exploring millions of bytes of information. This may cause anxiety for everyday persons not skilled at using their cell phones with cameras, or not up to date on Information Technology (IT).

In an article I recently found, <u>https://themuse.substack.com/p/is-ai-anxiety-affecting-your-art</u> Brigette Racine invited Kathryn Vercillo, author of The Artists' Mind: The Creative Lives and Mental Health of Famous Artists to share some ideas on combating our fears of AI. Here are a few tips to reduce AI anxiety. Learn how to use AI in its simplest form, this will help increase your sense of control. Spend time with creative people who are excited by their human creative processes. Investigate <u>https://glaze.cs.uchicago.edu/whatisglaze.html</u>: a tool to protect your work and a software app that protects digital images and AI scraping. Get involved in initiatives, actions, and organizations working toward artists' crea-

tive agency and creative rights. Make time to discuss your concerns and/or excitement about AI.

I am looking forward to reading The Artists' Mind: The Creative Lives and Mental Health of Famous Artists - I have to wait as it is on hold from our Edmonton Public Library.






ART CHAT

Seth chose 44 artists whose art work is in the book. He asked numerous questions and has tallied the responses.


