No member can receive both scholarships simultaneously. The receipt of a scholarship precludes the award of the same scholarship for ten years

(during this 10 year period, the awarding of the other scholarship is permitted.)

## GOOD TO KNOW

### TIPS - TRICKS - THINGS TO TRY

#### **A Better Palette**

I'm often asked what I use as a paint palette as I work in many mediums. I've used disposable paper palettes (but I hate wasting paper), ceramic plates (they have to be chipped first), paper plates (again the issue of wasting paper), plastic container lids (they're ok), styrofoam meat trays, glass from old frames (tape the edges so you don't cut yourself). I recently discovered the best so far... a glass Lazy Susan. The benefits are fantastic: if using acrylics, just soak in a sink of hot water and it all peels off and doesn't go down your drain. If using oils, use a razor to scrape off. It's got rounded edges so you can't cut yourself. It's made from tempered glass and won't easily break. It spins so you can reach all your paints, and it's raised so you can place it on top of art work and you are less likely to splash your paint. I gotta say it was the best discovery I've ever made! Hope you think so too!

#### **Acrylic Paint Disposal**

For proper disposal of acrylic paint waste water, pour it into a large plastic bucket and let the water evaporate. Then peel the paint skin that is left on the bottom of the bucket and throw it away. This will save your drains AND the environment.

Or, if you still pour down the drain – to keep solids out of your drain, make yourself a strainer. Stretch an old T-shirt over a plastic basket (the dollar store variety for organizing stuff) and secure it with a large rubber band or a small bungee cord, or stretch an old pair of panty hose over a bucket with drain holes punched through the bottom. When throwing away your rinse water, pour it into the basket and the T-shirt or panty hose will strain out any larger pieces of acrylic paint that might clog your drain.

#### **Take Better Photos**

Most smart phones take near professional-grade photos, so if you don't have a conventional camera, don't worry. Either way, you need at minimum a 5 megapixel device. When using a smart phone:

- Hold your phone parallel to, and centred over, your artwork, check the preview image.
- Smart phones handle artificial light poorly so it's best to shoot in daylight from a north window, to avoid direct sunlight. If the angle of light is low, stand a sketchbook next to the art in such a way that light bounces back onto your art from the other side.
- Take a breath before hitting that shutter release to avoid camera shake, or use a tripod and the timer delay feature.



Friendships are established, information is shared, opinions and ideas are exchanged in a supportive environment.











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
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
